# USA rules: internal webpages

Section 504 states, in part: "No otherwise qualified individual with a disability in the United States ... shall, solely by reason of her or his disability, be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance or under any program or activity conducted by any Executive agency..."

The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 or ADA is a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination based on disability. "Title II of the ADA requires state and local governments to make sure that their services, programs, and activities are accessible to people with disabilities."

Title III of the ADA "prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in the activities of places of public accommodation."

### USA rules: external webpages

"The **Rehabilitation Act of 1973** prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in programs conducted by Federal agencies, in programs receiving Federal financial assistance, in Federal employment, and in the employment practices of Federal contractors."

In 1998, Congress amended the Act to include **Section 508**, which states that "agencies must give disabled employees and members of the public access to information comparable to the access available to others."

Since 2018, the U.S. Access Board has required WCAG2.0AA.

# Legal cases

National Association of the Deaf v. Harvard and MIT

Department of Education's "Marcie Lipsitt Rule"

#### New DoJ rules

By April 2026 or 2027, all public colleges and universities must make all educational content WCAG 2.1AA compliant.

Additionally, the "technical and legal restrictions" clause should be used sparingly.

PDF/UA was discussed as a standard, but ultimately did not become a rule.

## **Implications**

What does this mean for American mathematicians?

All online educational content, including textbooks, lecture notes, handouts, assignments, must be WCAG2.1AA compliant.

This may or may not include PDFs posted to arXiv!

## Obstacle 1: LaTeX Usage

In the United States, most mathematicians self-teach LaTeX.

Most instructors do not learn about accessibility.

# Solution 1: LaTeX Usage

Standardized Webinars or Classes on LaTeX?

Make accessibility part of graduate studies?

### Obstacle 2: Institutional Support

Most colleges and universities hire instructional designers or have a Disability Resources department. Usually they are not mathematicians.

Wealthier university administrators simply budget for lawsuits; less wealthy university administrators often cannot provide funding for accessibility.

## Solution 2: Institutional Support

Threaten with lawsuits? Frame it as student success? Bad publicity??

Hire a mathematician to support accessibility?

#### Obstacle 3: Incentive Sturcture

Research faculty (with tenure) are often not incentivized to teach well.

Instructional faculty (without tenure) are often not provided with resources.

#### Solution 3: Incentive Sturcture

Funding for Accessibility?

Reward Accessibility Work?

#### Obstacle 4: Information

Several prominent accessibility organizations claim that PDFs created through LaTeX are never accessible.

As a result, it has been suggested that PDFs be banned.
